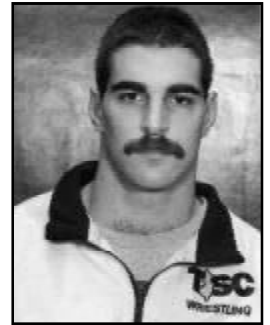
Hall of Fame Inductees

Glen Sandull

A two-time NCAA Division III Champion at heavy weight for The College of New Jersey in both 1993 and 1994. Sandull was also a two-time Metropolitan Conference champion at heavyweight as well as a two-year team captain for the Lions.

As a junior in 1993, Glen went 36-2 and became the College's first champion at heavyweight after competing the previous two seasons at 190 pounds. That season, the team finished in fifth place at the NCAA's. Sandull, seeded fourth entering the 1993 NCAA's went 4-0 with four decisions to collect the title with a 3-2 decision over Simpson's Don Finch in the finals. Over the course of the season, he was twice selected as the NJAC Wrestler of the Week, in helping the Lions collect the NJAC Championships as well as the Metropolitan Conference title as well. He was also honored by the *Newark Star Ledger* as its male athlete of the week. Among the titles he won on the year were a first place showing at the York College Invitational after racking up three straight pins and did not go into the third period in the tournament in any match. He was the 1993 Millersville Belles Tournament champion and a place finisher at the East Stroudsburg Open. He had 10 pins on the season with eight majors and one tech fall.

He successfully defended his 1993 title with a 5-3 overtime decision over Olivet's E. Thomas and helped the Lions finish in third place in the team standings at the 1994 NCAA's. As a senior he recorded six pins with two major decisions. Over the course of his senior season, he won titles at the Central Jersey Open, York Spartan Invitational, Millersville University Belles Tournament, and the Met Conference Championships. He was a runner-up at the East Stroudsburg Open.

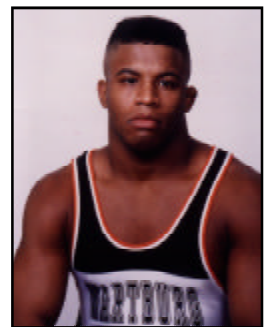


Jamal Fox

A three-time All-American and two-time national champion at Wartburg College, Jamal Fox is the second of head coach Jim Miller's wrestlers to be inducted into the NWCA Division III Hall of Fame. He joins former standout Tom Smith, who went in during the 2003 national championships hosted by Loras College of Dubuque, Iowa.

He earned back-to-back top two finishes at the NCAA Championships, placing second in 1995 and winning the title in 1996. Fox also concluded his career with three individual conference titles. Fox took the mat at 142 pounds and still holds the school record for most career victories boasting 166.

Currently a doctor of optometry at Groat Eye Care Associates in Greensboro, North Carolina, Fox was a part of four consecutive Iowa Conference team champions and the 1996 NCAA Division III National Championship Team.

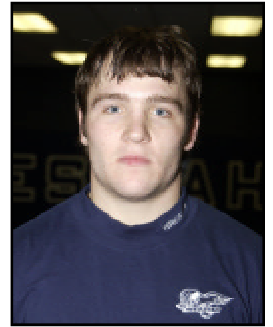
Mike Helm

Mike Helm was a three-time All-American for Messiah College placing sixth, seventh, and first. He compiled a career record of 112-26 for a career winning percentage of .812. He ranks third all time in wins for Messiah College and is ninth all time in pins.

Helm was a three-time MAC place winner and a MAC champion in 2000 as well as an Eastern Regional Champion in 1998 (Regional was discontinued after 1998).

In his freshman year, Helm was 11-4 and then went 33-13 the following year. As a junior, he was 31-7 before going 37-2 in his final season with the Falcons. Helm was a three-time Messiah Invitational Champion, a two-time place winner in the Millersville Invitational (largely Division I) and a third-place finisher in the Binghamton Invitational (Division I). In addition, Helm added titles from the Kings' Monarch Invitational, Cornell Matman Invitational, and the Petrofes Invitational.

Helm is currently teaching and coaching in North Carolina and continues to be involved with the Turner wrestling camps at Messiah College.



Russell "Rusty" Carlsten

Rhode Island College's Russell "Rusty" Carlsten's legacy as a prominent NCAA Division III wrestling coach lies on the achievement of a record five straight New England Conference Championship seasons from 1988-1992. The record still stands today along with his perennial top 20 national rankings during that era. His 22-year coaching career at RIC included being named New England Conference Coach of the Year five times as well as being the conference's Man of the Year twice as well.

His overall dual meet record is a sparkling 222-107-9 (.670 winning percentage). He coached eight All-Americans, four Academic All-Americans, produced 21 New England Conference Champions, and 96 all-conference grapplers.

Coach Carlsten was named to the Rhode Island Wrestling Association Hall of Fame in 1980, and received the organization's Pioneer Award in 1999. He has served on the Rhode Island Wrestling Officials' Association from 1967-present (President from 2004-2006).

At the collegiate level, Carlsten received the 25 Years of Service Award in 1992. He manned executive board positions for the New England Conference from 1986-88 as Vice President, and then 1988-1990 as President.

Rusty is most proud of his son, Scott who was a two-time NCAA Division III All-American, and finished his career as a four-time New England Conference Champion and undefeated wrestler in dual meets (70-0-1).

Kevin Puebla

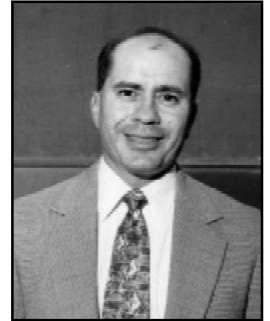
Kevin Puebla is the winningest wrestling coach in Augustana College history. During a 13-year career that spanned from 1987 through the 2000 season, Puebla compiled a dual meet record of 168-57-7 for a winning percentage of .739. His teams won 12 College Conference of Illinois & Wisconsin team titles in those 13 seasons and in the one year that the Vikings did not win the title (1997), they finished second. He produced such glowing dual meet records as 23-1 (1990-91), 16-1 (1994-95), 13-1 (1989-90) and 13-2 (1992-93).

He guided eight teams to top 25 finishes in the NCAA Division III national tournament with a fourth place finish in 1992 and a fifth place in 1991. He coached 21 All-Americans and two individual national champions. Craig Wagner won the 134 pound title in 1991 and Raphael Wilson won three championships (134 in 1992 and 141 in 1994 and 1995). He had 10 wrestlers named to the NWCA Division III Wrestling Coaches Association "Scholar-Athlete" team and three earn CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) Academic All-America honors.

Six wrestlers under his tutelage won "Most Outstanding Wrestler" honors in the CCIW and he coached a grand total of 61 individual conference champions. On the school's all-time list of career victories, 13 of the top 20 wrestled for Puebla and on the single season list 13 of the top 20 did it under his guidance. He coached a pair of athletes who at one time held national records: Raphael Wilson for career victories (175-5-1 in 1991-95) and Brad Schnowski for single season matches wrestled (63 with 52-11 in 1997-98).

A native of Moline, Illinois, Puebla spent seven seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Illinois from 1981-87 before joining the Augustana staff in April of 1987. A 1980 graduate of the University of Illinois, Puebla earned a Bachelor of Science degree in public health administration. He still ranks as one of the Illini's all-time greats in wrestling. He was the team MVP in 1976, 77 and 79 and served as team captain in 1978 and 1979. A three time NCAA qualifier, he earned NCAA Division I All-American honors in 1979.

A two time runner-up in the Big Ten Conference, at one time Puebla was the Illinois school record holder for both single season and career victories. He holds the unique distinction of having posted 100 victories at three different levels - high school, college and coaching. He was an Illinois High School State Champion at Moline in 1975 and he was the AAU national freestyle champion the same year. At the national Greco-Roman championship in 1975 he won the title in his weight class and was chosen the meet's Most Outstanding Wrestler.
